

### What we accomplished the 1st Year

- Adopted IGA between 3 regional governments establishing RTA
- Seated 1st Board
- Adopted By Laws
- Established and convened Community Advisory Committee and Administrative Advisory Committee
- Hired attorney and accounting firm
- Wrote and adopted policies (Conflict of Interest, Procurement Manual, Employee Manual)
- Created a strategic plan for 1<sup>st</sup> year
- Created a logo
- Designed website
- Located and set up an office
- Held 7 community meetings for input
- Negotiated and adopted 3 service IGAs with local governments to take over bus and shuttle routes
- Added night and weekend service to Lawson Hill
- Created a new southern route (and bought a van)
- Hired an Exec. Director
- Designing intercept lot with SMC
- Prepared and adopted 2018 budget

## 1<sup>st</sup> Year Lessons Learned

- 1. Running government is different than setting up government
- 2. It's going to take longer than you think to hire an ED
- 3. Use your mentors and others who have experience with RTA/transit
- 4. Make sure public understands difference between District boundaries and Service boundaries
- 5. Communicate regularly, often, even if you are not providing service yet
- 6. Make visible increases in service as soon as possible, but make sure they are well-thought out
- 7. Hold community meetings throughout service area
- 8. Make sure level of funding is appropriate, and know that there may be changes needed
- 9. Relationship between organization and jurisdictions may change
- 10. Be prepared to do many things you didn't think you would ever do
