

Steamboat Springs residents highly value the natural environment and the outdoor recreational opportunities available to them, and rates of use have increased.






#### Increased Parks and Recreation Use Over Time



Vision: Our community will enjoy a well-maintained parks system and a diverse range of core recreation services and facilities that meet community needs and continue to enhance the lives of a growing community.



#### **ACTION ITEMS: TRAILS**

# **ACTION ITEMS: TRAILS**

Designate Additional <u>directional and</u>
 single use trails at Emerald
 Mountain/Howelsen Open Space, and
 Spring Creek Open Space.

 Utilize existing facilities, develop a clearly marked <u>trailhead</u> at the base of <u>Howelsen Hill designating entrance of</u> <u>the Blackmer Trailhead</u> within Emerald Mountain trail system, easing congestion of Fairview neighborhood



#### **ACTION ITEMS: TRAILS**



- Continue to <u>improve on-street connectivity</u> by providing bicycle lanes/routes, walks and improved crossings/underpasses at US40.
- Seek <u>opportunities to implement other trail connections</u> where needed or with development and/or road improvements.
- Assess <u>social trails</u> on City owned lands to determine if they should be brought into the system and legitimized or closed and revegetated and be a resource to the community and partners to address social trails on private land.

#### **ACTION ITEMS: OPEN SPACE**

- Expand the open space system by acquiring/preserving additional lands. As the City boundary expands, target open space areas with priority on lands adjacent to existing lands to provide additional trails and habitat connectivity.
- <u>Partner</u> with Yampa Valley Land Trust (updated: Colorado Cattlemen's Agricultural Land Trust), Routt County, and other conservation-oriented groups to conserve land.
- Develop <u>management plans</u> alongside Routt
   County and other partners, for all open space and natural area properties with the goal of balancing resource values with public use.



#### **ACTION ITEMS: ADULT REC**

- Expand number of sand <u>volleyball courts</u> and upgrade volleyball and tennis court <u>lighting</u> (repair failing service lines, reposition light locations and upgrade to new energy efficient LED bulbs).
- Continue to work with <u>local partners</u> and organizations to obtain <u>indoor gym space</u> to host sports programming during the fall and winter months.
- If funding partners emerge and/or the community supports a funding source that could cover construction and operational cost (after funding other higher priority projects), a <u>multi-purpose indoor facility</u> should be constructed. \* This Action is also referenced in the Tennis Center, Ice Arena, and Adult Sports section.
- Evaluate <u>structure of programming</u> to specifically target and increase involvement of <u>aging</u> <u>and casual adult sports participants</u>.

#### **ACTION ITEMS: YOUTH**

- Proactively take part and collaborate with <u>community groups</u> that are also <u>looking to</u>
   <u>expand youth/childcare space</u> including, but not limited to, First Impressions and Routt
   County Youth Services Coalition.
- P3
- Collaborate with partners to regularly update City Council, and the community as a whole, on the current childcare landscape so they are aware of <u>capacity issues and</u> <u>facility limitations</u>.
- Explore licensing additional City facilities as they become available to <u>increase City</u> owned programmable space to house current and future programs.
- Consider meeting the communities needs and requests for early childhood care by establishing programs that <u>service youth five years of age and younger</u>.



#### **ACTION ITEMS: TENNIS**





- Increase available indoor space for Pickleball courts.
- Consider if the Ski Town Park Complex is an appropriate location to meet the gym space and indoor fields action referenced in facility section action #8.

- Continue to grow the Tennis Center <u>Endowment</u> fund.
- P3
- Offset or reduce maintenance money needed from the City.

#### **ACTION ITEMS: PARKS**





- Implement <u>deferred projects</u> list for existing park improvements (restroom and playground replacements, irrigation systems, shelters, bridge repairs, skate park equipment replacement etc.).
- Heritage Park Do not let lease expire; request a 1 year extension

- Implement the <u>Bear River Park Master Plan</u>, but focus on <u>river access improvements</u> and maintaining existing facilities in the <u>shorter term</u>.
  - P3
- While desired, wait to designate additional off-leash dog areas until existing areas can be evaluated over several years for potential impacts (e.g. loss of vegetation, water quality, impact to wildlife).
  - Construct <u>at least one fenced dog park</u>.

# **ACTION ITEMS: SKI AREA**





- Repair or Replace ski lifts and jumps at Howelsen Hill.
- <u>Stabilize</u> the Howelsen Hill Ski Area.
- Maintain and upgrade existing
   Howelsen Hill <u>facilities</u> including
   restrooms, the lodge and
   concessions, pedestrian and bike
   connections, pedestrian lighting,
   aesthetics, landscaping and skate
   park replacement.

#### **ACTION ITEMS: ICE ARENA**

- Develop lobby area at the Howelsen Ice Arena to existing footer, adding an additional 1,140 square feet to build a designated <u>women's locker</u> room.
- Design and develop a second floor addition to the Howelsen Ice Arena to include an additional 2,965 square feet of <u>programmable space</u>.
- Alleviate capacity demands at the Howelsen Ice Arena by installing an <u>outdoor, seasonal,</u> <u>refrigerated ice sheet</u>.
- Alleviate capacity demands at the Howelsen Ice Arena by completion of the <u>Youth Sports Arena</u> addition.
- Continue to expand Howelsen Ice Arena <u>programming during slower seasons</u> of when ice time is available.





 Lead and partner on designated actions in the <u>Yampa River Health Assessment and</u> <u>Streamflow Management Plan</u>, including:

- Establishing a native riparian revegetation program
- Improving City-owned diversion structures to increase efficiency and to reduce fish passage barriers
- Participating in the City Stream Team
- Identifying high priority parcels for acquisition for open space
- Restoring streamflow during drought conditions through voluntary, market-based water leases and releases from reservoir storage.
- Work with partners to monitor river health management objectives and indicators identified in the Yampa River Health Assessment and Streamflow Management Plan.

- Continue and <u>expand education</u> of river users regarding protecting the riparian and aquatic habitat and exhibiting respectful behavior through the following:
  - Yampa River signage
  - River Ranger Program
  - Friends of the Yampa / Yampa River Clean Up Days
  - Guest education (brochures, videos, local TV ads)
  - · City website and social media
- Evaluate the effectiveness and funding costs of the <u>River Ranger program</u> and identify future direction and actions.




• Establish yearly monitoring program to assess impacts (e.g. increased trash, riparian vegetation damage) of recreation users to determine if management policies should be changed to protect resources (e.g. limits on number of tubers and permits required) and consider increasing commercial tube allowances and promote their use to decrease negative impacts to the river system from private tubers.



- Continue to <u>implement policy limiting</u>
   recreational use of the river when habitat and
   river health could be negatively impacted, in
   consultation with Colorado Parks and Wildlife
   (e.g. water temperature, dissolved oxygen,
   and/or low flows).
- Continue to <u>implement the conceptual</u>
   <u>recommendations</u> of the Yampa River
   Structural Plan, and monitor and maintain
   existing river features for form and function.

- Protect the City's Recreational Instream Channel Diversion (RICD) water right by maintaining the C & D Hole structures, and maintaining the 13th Street gauge.
- Monitor and control <u>invasive species</u>.
- Monitor and maintain <u>existing river</u> <u>features</u> for form and function
- Create a boating take-out point at <u>Bear</u> River Park.




#### FISCAL SUSTAINABILITY GOALS

- 1. Increase funding that is allocated to maintain existing assets, and do not add elements to the PROSTR system without funding to maintain them.
- 2. Further explore community support for a tax to fund high priority projects and their operations and maintenance.
- 3. Maximize partnerships with the school district, Yampa Valley Land Trust, CPW, Triple Crown and others to provide and manage recreational facilities, and conserve and manage public lands.
- 4. Assess the value Parks and Recreation Department facilities and programs bring to the area's economy through lodging, sales and job creation.
