




Dear Mayor Crompton,

The Lílwat Nation, on our unceded lands, do declare ourselves the rightful owners of our lands since time immemorial. The Lílwat Nation finds it necessary to establish a proper relationship with any and all groups accessing Lílwat territory in industry, recreation, and private enterprising.

On June 21, 2021, the *United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples*Act received Royal Assent and came into force. This Act provides a roadmap for the Government of Canada and First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples to work together to implement the UN Declaration based on lasting reconciliation, healing, and cooperative relations.

On June 21, 2023 the UN Declaration Act Action Plan, developed in consultation and cooperation with First Nations, Inuit and Métis from across Canada was released. The implementation of the Action Plan and of the UN Declaration will contribute to the Government of Canada's continued efforts to break down barriers, combat systemic racism and discrimination, close socio-economic gaps, and promote greater equality and prosperity for Indigenous peoples.

We speak frequently on meaningful relationships and partnerships with governments, neighbouring communities and all who frequent the Lilwat lands. We call upon all who are dedicated to meaningful relations to recognize and adopt the Act on the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People.


